CONTINGENCY PLAN: CASE SCENARIO A

Case scenario A will correspond to a diminished on-site academic activity due to social distancing measures affecting the permitted capacity of classrooms.

METHODOLOGY

General clarifications on the methodology on case scenario A

A multimodal (hybrid) teaching system will be adopted, combining both on-site and remote classes via videoconference (synchronous) that will be held in the timetable approved by the corresponding Faculty or School. The time distribution of teaching activities (both on-site and remote) will be decided by the aforementioned Faculties and Schools bearing in mind the permitted capacity of classrooms and social distancing measures as established at that time.

In this course, class work will focus on the five communicative skills and include individual, pairwork and group exercises. The methodology also includes explanations and presentations about grammar and vocabulary, with



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related activities. These may be supplemented with online presentations, exercises, coursework materials and other materials at the teacher's discretion.

On-site teaching activities will be held via videoconference (synchronous) in the timetable approved by the corresponding Faculty or School. Alternative activities will be proposed for reduced groups in order to guarantee the acquisition of course competences.



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Class work will be conducted via online teaching focused on the five communicative skills. Videoconferencing software and chats will be used. Materials uploaded to Moodle will include presentations about grammar and vocabulary with voice explanations, exercises, audio files and extra practice activities. Coursebook materials will also be used. Students will be provided with exercise keys and there will be teacher monitoring and feedback so that they can assess their own progress.
