OBJECTIVES

The main objective of this course is to help students achieve a degree of competence in English corresponding to the B2 level (vantage or upper-intermediate) of the CEFRL (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages).

The focus will be on the understanding and use of more grammatical structures of English as well as on communicative skills: written and oral comprehension (reading and listening) and written and oral production and interaction (writing and speaking). At the B2 level, students will be independent users of English who will be able to:

- Understand the main ideas of complex written and oral texts on both concrete and abstract topics.
- Interact with a degree of fluency and spontaneity that makes regular interaction with native speakers quite possible without strain for either party.
- Produce clear, detailed text on a wide range of subjects and explain a viewpoint on a topical issue giving the advantages and disadvantages of various options.

General clarifications on instruments for evaluation:

Global assessment will be based on:

- 1. Final EXAM (50%). This exam will consist of different parts, but the mark will be global:
- Short answer questions (use of English, reading comprehension and vocabulary).
- Long answer questions (grammar explanation).
- 2. SPEAKING activity: an interview with the teacher ('oral presentations') (10%).
- 3. LISTENING test ('real and simulated tasks') (10%).
- 4. Two WRITING assignments ('essay') (20%).
- 5. Class assignments ('case studies') (10%). Class assignments are related to the active involvement of students during the course in a wide range of individual, pair and/or group activities that will be specified at the beginning of the course. These assignments may be done on any practical session and the teacher will not necessarily notify the students.

First call (January)

Students must obtain at least 5 out of 10 points in all the skills assessed separately (Final Exam, Listening, Writing, Speaking) (with the exception of class assignments [case studies]) in order to pass the subject in the 1st Ordinary Call (January). The marks of the parts that students have passed in the January call will be valid in the 2nd Ordinary Call (February), but not in the Extraordinary Calls.

Second call (February)

All students re-sitting an exam in the 2nd Ordinary Call (February) must obtain at least 5 out of 10 points in all the skills assessed separately (with the exception of the Class Assignments) to pass the course.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Attendance and participation do not receive a numerical grade but students must attend at least 80% of the SMALL GROUP (practical) sessions in order to be evaluated through continuous assessment in the Ordinary Calls.

Clarifications on the methodology for part-time students and students with disabilities and special educational needs:

Part-time students and students with disabilities and special educational needs will be assessed following the same criteria. However, they will have to communicate their condition to the teacher at the beginning of the course (during the first two weeks).

Clarifications on the evaluation of the extraordinary call and extra-ordinary call for completion studies:

Assessment will be as follows:

Exam: 80% Writing: 10% Listening: 10%

Students must obtain 5 out of 10 average points to pass the course.

The Extraordinary Call is for those students who have sit at least one exam session, either in the current academic



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year or in previous years. The assessment will be governed by the contents and criteria reflected in the teaching guide for the current academic year.
