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Method of assessment of attendance:

Attendance and Participation in class(Log) make up 30% of the final grade. The marks will be given following both criteria, i.e., attendance only is not enough to get the maximum punctuation.

A minimum of 50% attendance is mandatory to opt for the course early exam.

General clarifications on instruments for evaluation:

1.- Attendance and Participation in class (Log) make up 30% of the final grade. The marks will be given following both criteria, i.e., attendance only is not enough to get the maximum punctuation. Participation and classwork will be registered. Regardless of the cause, students who cannot attend classes will not be awarded any marks in this section.

2.- Oral group presentation on a topic given by the lecturer: 30% of the final grade. The rules and criteria for assessment will be further explained during the course.

3.- Exam: 40% of the final grade. Students attending to a minimum of 50% of the sessions will be able to take the early exam. The rest will have to take it in the official date.

If plagiarism/cheating occurred, the correspondent work, assignment, presentation or test will be awarded 0 marks. Also, the lecturer may additionally determine not to grade any other future work or test from that student and/or charge them with plagiarism. Material created using Artificial Intelligence (e.g. ChatGPT) will be considered plagiarism.
