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OBJECTIVES

The main objective of this course is to make students achieve a degree of competence in English corresponding to the B1.1 level (intermediate) of the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR). The focus will be on the five different skills: written comprehension (reading), oral comprehension (listening), written expression (writing), oral expression (speaking), and oral interaction. When reaching the B1.1 level the student will be able to:

- enter unprepared into conversation on familiar topics, express personal opinions and exchange information on topics that are familiar, of personal interest or pertinent to everyday life (e.g. family, hobbies, work, travel and current affairs);
- use a wide range of simple language to deal with most situations likely to arise whilst travelling;
- briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions, plans and actions;
- give descriptions on a variety of familiar subjects and describe an event (real or imagined) in writing and speaking;
- describe dreams, hopes and ambitions;
- convey simple, straightforward information of immediate relevance, getting across which point he/she feels is most important.

General clarifications on instruments for evaluation:

January call:

First ordinary call (January call):

The final grade will be based on several tests and other class tasks:

- [Exams] Final exam (50%): Grammar (20%), Vocabulary (20%), Reading (10%).
- [Real and/or simulated tasks] Listening (10%)
- [Essay] Writing (20%).
- [Oral presentation] Speaking (10%).
- [Case study] Class assignments (10%)

Students must obtain at least 5 out 10 points in all the skills assessed separately (final exam, listening, writing, and speaking) in order to pass subject in the 1st ordinary call. The marks of the parts that students have passed in the January call will be valid in the 2nd ordinary call (February), but no in the extraordinary calls (September and April calls).

Class assignments are related to the active involvement of students during the course by doing several individual/pair and/or group activities in class.

Attendance will not count for the final marks; however, students must attend 80% of the time allocated to the the practical lessons so as to consider students' class assignments.

2nd ordinary call (february):

All students re-sitting an exam in the 2nd ordinary call must obtain at least 5 out of 10 points in the following parts: final exam, listening, writing and speaking skills in order to pass the subject. Class assignments cannot be retaken in the second call.

Qualifying criteria for obtaining HONORS: Students will need to get at least 9 points out of 10 in their final mark. It will be awarded at the teacher's discretion. No more than 5% of the students enrolled in this course will be awarded such a recognition.

Clarifications on the methodology for part-time students and students with disabilities and special educational needs:

Part-time students and students with disabilities and special educational needs will be assessed following the same criteria. However, they will have to communicate their condition to the teacher at the beginning of the course (during the first two weeks) so that they can agree on the dates that best suit the students to fulfill the different tasks.

Clarifications on the evaluation of the extraordinary call and extra-ordinary call for completion studies:

Assessment will be as follows:

- Final exam (100%): Grammar, (20%), vocabulary (20%), reading (20%), writing (20%), listening (10%) and speaking (10%).

Students must obtain 5 out of 10 average points to pass the course. The extraordinary call is for those students who have sit at least one exam session, either in the current academic year or in previous years. The assessment will follow the contents and criteria reflected in the teaching guide for the current academic course.
