### **OBJECTIVES**

The main objective of this course is to make students achieve a level of competence in English corresponding to the B1.2 level (intermediate) of the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR). The focus will be on the five different skills: written comprehension (reading), oral comprehension (listening), written expression (writing), oral expression (speaking) and oral interaction. When reaching the B1.2 level, students will be able to:

- understand the main points of clear standard input on familiar matters regularly encountered at work, school, leisure activities, etc.;

- interact with a degree of fluency and spontaneity that makes regular interaction with native speakers quite possible;

- present clear, detailed descriptions on a wide range of subjects related to their field of interest;
- describe personal experiences and events, goals and achievements;
- briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans.

#### General clarifications on instruments for evaluation:

Students will have the following assessment criteria in the first (June) and second (July) ordinary calls:

- Case study (Forum and Tarea on Moodle): 15% of the final grade. Students will have to participate in discussion forums and submit some oral and other activities via Moodle.

- Essay (Tarea on Moodle): 20% of the final grade. Students will have to submit one final writing assignment by the end of the course.

- Exams (Cuestionario on Moodle): 35% of the final grade. Students will have to pass one test per unit (10% in total) and a final test (25%), including grammar, vocabulary, reading and listening. Each of the parts of the final test must be passed.

- Oral presentations (Tarea on Moodle): 20% of the final grade. Students will have to submit a final oral assignment by the end of the course.

- Project (Tarea on Moodle): 10% of the final grade. Students will have to prepare and submit a project about a cultural aspect of an English-speaking country of their choice (with audio).

Further information about the assessment activities and tasks will be provided at the beginning of the course.

NOTE 1: A minimum grade of 5 for each part is necessary to pass the course. Each of the parts of the final exam must be passed separately, that is, reading, listening and grammar/vocabulary must be all passed to calculate the final grade.

NOTE 2: All the passed parts will be kept for the second ordinary call (in July), but no grades will be kept for the extraordinary calls.

NOTE 3: Plagiarism and/or cheating during the performance of ANY of the assignments (exams, expositions, class



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activities, etc.) carried out during the course will be punished with instant fail in the subject. This also includes the use of any artificial intelligence tool such as ChatGPT or similar. The teachers reserve the right to conduct a personal interview about any of the works presented in class, with anyone, to clarify any aspect in this regard. Legal proceedings might be derived.

# Clarifications on the methodology for part-time students and students with disabilities and special educational needs:

Part-time students and students with special learning capacities will be assessed under the same criteria. However, flexibility will be offered regarding deadlines.

# Clarifications on the evaluation of the extraordinary call and extra-ordinary call for completion studies:
